Wines to look for at the 45th Vancouver International Wine Festival

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The Vancouver International Wine Festival turns 45 next week.

If you traditionally define generations as the time between the birth of parents and their offspring, the annual festival of the grape is moving into its third generation. You could tag it Generation Nine on the theory that most wine drinkers reshape their palates every five years. Consider where we have come from since 1979. We have gone from Old World to New World wines, then back to Old World wines with New World influence and New World wines with Old World influence and now what we like to call Next World wines. Remember varietal wines versus blends? Country-wide mixes versus specific terroir-based appellations wines? We have sipped valley wines versus hillside wines, and there was all-new oak, no oak, French oak versus American oak debates and now neutral oak, concrete and ancient amphora—big tannins, supple tannins, organic versus biodynamic, and now sustainable wines. Remember cool climates versus warm? Cult wines, the Yellow Tail phenomenon, and the phenomenal growth of local wines? It's been quite a ride.

Year 45 illustrates the learning curve as tasters wade into the high-acid, dry tannins of Northern Italy's "food" wines: Barolo, Barbaresco, and Chianti. Throw in the Apulia, Sicilia, Sardegna, and over 1,000 grape varieties, and explore another world.

This Insider's Guide is designed to get you around the room, touching on some of the many highlights, but in the end, we can only scratch the surface. Use it to start your tour and perhaps keep you focused when your palate fatigues. As always, expect the unexpected. Stop at a winery you have never heard of and give them a chance to tell their story. You never really know what will be in that glass until you taste it, and whether you taste what will soon become an eternal favourite or discover something new, sharing your experience with friends is what wine appreciation is all about. SEEK OUT SPARKLERS

Experienced and eagle-eyed festival goers will notice no Champagne producers present this year, which is a shame. However, it leaves the door open to explore other sparkling styles, grapes, and regions.
